#### Course Description:

M100: Personal and Professional Identity Development is a one-hour Poole required course which will help you learn and develop multiple facets of identity such as social, cultural, leadership and career choices. By exploring who you are, you will have a better understanding of how you can interrelate with others in a global business market. Through this course, you will learn about yourself, others and how you can use your identity to create an action plan for future success at NC State, become engaged in your local community and engage in career path exploration

#### Learning Outcomes:

- Students will define what creates identity and describe, in their own words, how it compares and contrasts with others
- Students will compare and contrast identities so they can identify areas for growth and development.
- Students will apply self-awareness to select engagement activities that are directly related to their growth areas.
- Students will synthesize the understanding of their identity in order to formulate as well as demonstrate engagement and involvement as professional global citizens that aligns with their self-awareness.

In order to facilitate the class discussions and provide multiple opportunities for individuals to engage, you have been divided into groups that will meet in-class each week for various activities. It is important that each person participates in the Pack Group discussions. Your pack group is an opportunity for you to meet other Poole students and grow your academic and professional network. As your Pack Group is meeting, I will be monitoring and engaging in your group's discussions.

# Pack Group Leaders

Each week, one member of the group will serve as the "conversation extender" or facilitator. Students will be notified by the second day of class which week they are assigned to be the group leader. The weekly group leader will be provided additional questions via email at least two days before class. The group leader is expected to be familiar with these questions and utilize them to facilitate the conversation in the Pack groups. It is not the expectation that the group leader will dominate the conversation but rather provide ways for the conversation to extend in length and quality.

## <u>Assignments:</u>

Assignments in M100 build over the course of 8-weeks to help you explore your own identity, identities of others and how your identity can inform your professional aspirations within a global context. All assignments are due at the start of class unless stated otherwise by the instructor. Both the midterm and final assignment will be reduced one-letter grade per day the assignment is late after the submission deadline.

#### Participation: 40%

This course is centered on conversation, dialogue with classmates and in-class activities. Participating and attending every class is essential to the learning process, especially as the class is only 8-weeks. Students must arrive to class on-time and be prepared with pre-class homework/materials/readings and participate in class activities. Failure to prepare for class or non-participation in discussion will result in a mark of non-participation for the day. Likewise, tardiness or missing class unexcused will result in a lower participation grade.

#### Homework: 20%

Before the next week's class, you will be required to complete various readings, assignments, videos or tasks. To be able to participate in class and build material toward your final poster project, you must complete the assigned homework assignments. All homework is due by class time via Moodle unless otherwise mentioned by your instructor. Late submissions are not accepted and will result in a zero for the assignment. (5 assignments, 4 points each)

#### Attendance & Participation: 18%

Attendance is mandatory for all classes in order to understand course content and be successful in your final project. Each student is allocated 1 missed class without penalty. If you miss 2 classes, you will not receive any credit for attendance. If you miss more than two classes, you will fail the course as you have missed over 25% of course content.

Arriving late or leaving class early constitutes 1/2 of an absence. (Example: 2 lates or 2 leaving class early=1 full absence). A student who has missed 2 classes and then has a half absence will fail the course.

As participation in group and class discussion is essential to learning, instructors reserve the right to deduct participation points for students who do not meaningfully engage in discussion within the course or pack group.

#### Pre & Post Class Assessment Surveys: 2%

You will also complete a pre-class and post-class 2 minute surveys that will be sent to you by your instructor. Each survey is required and counts toward 1% of your final grade (both surveys = 2% of grade).

Midterm Reflection: 30%

To synthesize the first four weeks of identity discovery in the class, you will submit a 2-3 page reflection paper on your personal identities and how they relate/contrast with others. Papers will be submitted via the class Moodle page. More information (including rubric) about your midterm paper can be found on Moodle.

#### **Poster Presentation: 30%**

On the final day of class, you will present an identity poster that includes the multiple facets of identity discussed in class, your areas of growth & improvement and highlight your action plan for continued exploration. Your poster will be a visual representation of your understanding and application of the four learning outcomes of the class. Each student will be required to present their poster to the class via conference poster sessions. Half the class will present in the first 50 minutes of class with instructors and peers providing feedback on your work. Then the class will switch so readers will now become presenters. A successful poster will explore multiple facets of identity and synthesize the identities into an actionable plan for success at NC State and their future career goals.
