This being stated, we want to offer you, the evaluators, three tips and practices when evaluating proposals that align with NACADA's core values.

[Core Value: Inclusivity & Empowerment]

Amy Korthank 1:51

This tip aligns with the core value of inclusivity and empowerment. Timely discussions and hot topics are subjective, but carry value to diverse populations.

As you begin to skim through your assigned proposals, take time to identify ones that might be outside of your comfort zone, or area of expertise.

Look up the reference list and explore for more insight in the presenter's argument. Familiarize yourself with the topic before you determine the proposal would be suitable for NACADA conference.

It is imperative that we acknowledge our differences in viewpoints. Those viewpoints are determined by our personally lived and observed experiences.

While we may only be able to speak truth to our own experiences, as well as similar experiences lived by others, we must acknowledge those diverse experiences lived by individuals who are not like us.

[Core Value: Integrity, Professionalism & Respect]

This tip aligns with integrity, professionalism, and respect. Be honest in your reviews, but avoid being overly critical, vague or dismissive of proposal topics you do not understand or topics outside your area of expertise.

Be helpful and resourceful in your feedback. Make suggestions for proposals that lack the necessary foundation for acceptable proposals. For example, if a proposal does not have listed references, it's okay to recommend references or suggest the proposal authors use a reference list, if needed.

Practice transparency in your evaluations by asking questions in your feedback in order to give writers a direction.

Statements like I don't know much about this topic, but if accepted, how do you present this to someone like me, demonstrates respect and integrity as it provides a frame of mind for the proposal writer, conference committee member who is considering your comments for acceptance.

It also provides clarity for the writer by giving them something to think about for either the actual presentation, or writing proposals for future conferences.

[Core Value: Caring & Commitment]

Michelle Smith Ware 4:11

This tip aligns with caring, and commitment. Read proposals with a clear mind. schedule a time where you can read, comment and evaluate your assigned proposals.

This time should be with as few distractions as possible. In the world of juggling our professional obligations with extra personal duties, it is imperative that we keep a clear and focused mindset when evaluating other people's work and topics that we may not fully know or understand.

Be mindful of your personal feelings and beliefs when you are reading and evaluating another person's work. While you may or may not agree with the position or the method of delivery, be thoughtful in your responses.

If there is a concern that needs to be addressed regarding the proposal's integrity, make suggestions in a clear and positive manner. For example, it's okay to share your concerns about the relevance of topics.

However, be thoughtful in doing so. Proposals for the annual conference come from all over the world.

While a particular topic may or may not have relevance in your life or area, it could be very pertinent in another person's life elsewhere.
